On February 12, 1974 MOW delivered the first meals to nine clients in Raleigh. Fast forward to 2024 and 11 million+ meals and 200,000+ clients later – it's time to celebrate 50 years of serving our Wake County senior neighbors in need of meals and companionship!

Two highlights during this year of celebrations are The Golden Disco 50th Anniversary Party in April and Hunger Week, focused on Senior Hunger, co-hosted with Meredith College in March.

The main event of the year is our anniversary party - The Golden Disco! This is our first event in five years and all are invited to join the party as we celebrate 70's style. The Golden Disco is on April 25, 2024 at The Umstead Hotel and Spa in Cary. The evening includes a silent auction with spectacular items, a live auction,

A Message of Gratitude from the Executive Director

Back when I was a kid, in the days before the first astronaut walked on the moon, I always enjoyed going to my grandma's house during this time of year because she received all kinds of Christmas catalogs. While I know now the aim of these catalogs was to sell products, I remember flipping through the pages and imagining what it would be like to be an explorer, a scientist, or a fireman.

Meals on Wheels Wake County is at the season when we are imagining how we want to celebrate our 50th Anniversary in 2024 and how we want to invest our Mackenzie Scott Grant to impact the future. While we do not have a catalog of options from which to choose, we have smart and creative people working on this effort.

The need for our services will continue to increase as our senior population continues to grow, especially for older adults over the age of 80, and it will be important to ascertain how to best deliver our mission in an ever-changing world. We want to decide both how to expand our services and how to increase the number of participants we serve.

Our service model depends heavily on volunteers to deliver meals and provide social connections and our goal is to be the best in recruiting, retaining, and recognizing volunteers. By building on our past successes we can be successful in the future.

Funding is also critical for our future success. Public policy impacts our federal, state, and county funding. We need to communicate our outcome measurements to maintain and, if possible, increase our public funding. Additionally we can position our program services to healthcare providers and payers as they become more knowledgeable about improved health outcomes and long-term medical cost savings. Current donors are so important to us in supporting our critical work. Our donors have multiple choices for their philanthropic funds, and we want to make the case for their continued contributions.

Furthering Health Access for Seniors

With flu season fast approaching, we partnered with Diaper Train, Vaccine Ambassadors, and UNC Health to host free Flu Vaccine events at our Rosenwald, Five Points, and Capital Towers Friendship Cafe locations this fall. According to the CDC, "People 65 years and older are at higher risk of developing serious complications from flu, compared with young, healthy adults. This risk is due in part to changes in immune defenses with increasing age. While flu seasons vary in severity, during most seasons people 65 years and

older bear the greatest burden of severe flu disease." Thanks to the help of our vaccine clinic partners, we can increase seniors' access to flu vaccines to bolster their immune health.


What Meals on Wheels Means to Our Clients

"My sarcoidosis, which affects my lungs and heart, flared up last July. I was in the hospital for 2 weeks- my cousin helped me get on Meals on Wheels. I live by myself, and wasn't able to cook when I first got home. Meals on Wheels meals helped. Meals on wheels has meant a lot- there are some people that that's the only meal they get. "Meals on Wheels means a lot to me-especially since I don't drive. I hate to ask my kids to take me here and there-they have their own lives.
